Your Excellencies, honoured guests, ladies and gentlemen. Talofa, warm Pacific greetings from Tuvalu. Today, I speak again from my country, from a small island that is likely to be one of the first spots in Tuvalu to be submerged by rising sea levels.

Rising sea levels will submerge Tuvalu in a matter of decades.

At COP27, Minister Simon Kofe shared his country's plan for survival.

We have no choice but to become the world's first digital nation.

At COP27, Accenture partnered with the Pacific Nation of Tuvalu to announce the relocation of a country to the metaverse.

The Minister delivered his speech from the first piece of Tuvalu to be digitized and the first part to be completely submerged due to climate change.

The speech directed people to a landing page, inviting the public to show their support.

Tuvalu is now starting the process of working out how to catalogue, map, record and save as much of the island as possible.

Historical documents, records of cultural practices, family albums and traditional song are just some of the things that will be making their way to the metaverse.

These are the first steps in a long yet inevitable, process.
